A Bank at Redford.

On Monday of this week, Thos. C. Houghton, Fred L. DeNio, Chas. A. Lahser, Allen M. Bosworth, Samuel D. Holcomb, M. Byron Pierce, Fred M. Warner and Clinton W. Wilber organized a co-partnership for the purpose of establishing and maintaining a private bank at Redford village, Wayne county, Michigan.

The organization being in the form of a partnership will give the people of that vicinity a banking institution with a financial backing of about \$150,000, almost four times the strength of a state bank with \$20,000 capital. A new building for the accommodation of the bank patrons will be erected at once on the corner east of A. M. Bosworth's store, and it is expected to have the office ready for business in June. Redford is a small hustling village, nine miles from Detroit on the Grand River road, with a population of nearly 300 people.

Messrs. Houghton, DeNio, Bosworth, Lahser, and Holcomb are prominent business men of Redford and Messrs. Pierce, Warner and Wilber live at Farmington.

Village Election.

Monday was such a quiet day that many people forgot there was a very important public function transpiring. Only 25 votes out of a possible 150 were polled.

Interest in civic affairs has reached a pretty low ebb in Farmington. There are those who will deny this and will say that as there was only one ticket in the field there was no use of putting one's self to the bother of voting.

All of the officials were re-elected and the writer wonders how they appreciate the appreciation that their fellow townsmen have thus shown of their services during the past year. The power of example is wonderful, and if these officials shall during the coming year show an equal forgetfulness and disregard of civic duty, who will be to blame?

It is to be hoped, however, that these village officials will look at the brighter side and will try to derive a compliment from the seeming implicit trust that the good people of Farmington have reposed in them as unselfish patriots willing to serve the public without so much as a "thank you, sir."
