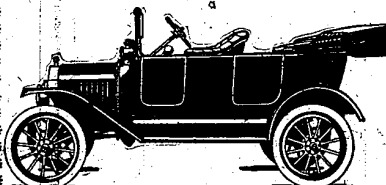

In the first place comes the filing of petitions for presidential candidates, the last day of which is on March 1st. Then comes our village election on March 13th. April 3—Presidential primary and township election.

Soon After—Caucuses for all parties to name delegates to county conventions.

June 7—Republican national convention at Chicago.

April or May—State conventions of all parties.

June 14—Democratic national convention at St. Louis.

June 21—Ball Moose national convention at Chicago.

July 19—Prohibition national convention at Minneapolis.

July 29—Last day for filing petitions for senatorial, congressional, state and county office.

August 29—State primary election.

Within Ten Days—County candidates to elect chairman and secretaries of county committees.

Very Soon After—County conventions of all parties.

Sept. 20, (about)—State conventions of all parties.

November 7—National, senatorial, congressional, state, legislative and county elections.

The above calendar will be a reference to keep in a convenient place. Then, this the year for a general registration. However, one registration will answer for all, as there is no special registration for a primary election—when a voter registers once in the spring he is registered for four years, unless he changes his residence in the meantime.

There is truly a busy year ahead for the politician, and it will keep the voter "stepping stone" to keep out of Mr. Politician's reach when the game begins to get interesting.
