The suit being brought in the Wayne county circuit court by the city of Detroit to test the validity of the new automobile tax law is to be pushed to completion and a supreme court decision secured as soon possible, it was announced here after Corporation Counsel Dingeman and Attorney General Fellows had held a conference. The state's legal department will be represented in the Wayne county court next Saturday morning when the mandamus against the board of assessors is returnable. The case will not be fought by the Attorney General's department in the lower court; Attorney General Fellows and Mr. Dingeman believed the case can be pushed to a decision as far as Wayne county is concerned in 30 days. This would bring it up for argument before the supreme court early in the April term. In case that it is argued at the April term a decision can be expected by May 1, or shortly thereafter.—Detroit Courier.

Laws For Spearing Fish

The state game and fish department calls the attention of winter fishermen and sportsmen to the new law governing the spearing of fish through the ice. The new act has narrowed the time by two months during which fish may be speared. It is now lawful to spear through the ice only during the months of January and February. It is feared that many fishermen believe that the same law holds as in 1914, by which they were allowed to spear fish during December, January, February and March.
