Miss Mina Cooney, of Pontiac, who has been the guest of Mrs. Wm. Irish for some time past, returned to that city Monday.

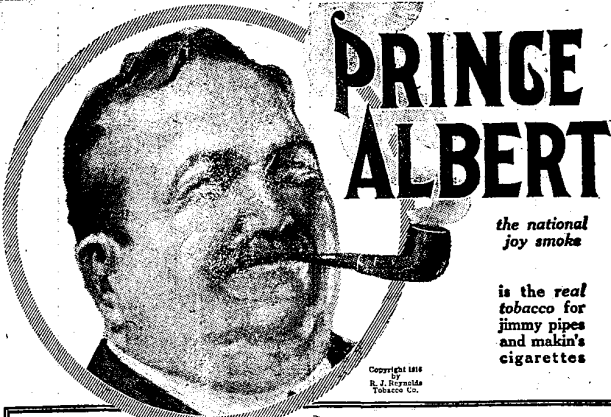
