Pontiac will have a Chautauqua the latter part of June or the first of July.

There were 3,781 deaths in Michigan during February, and 6,543 births.

There are 23 cases of small-pox reported in Detroit, and an epidemic is feared.

A new temporary bridge is to be built to Belle Isle, costing \$99,999, to be ready for use by July 4th.

Northville voted Tuesday to bond the village and school district for \$55,000 to build a new school house, to replace the one recently burned, and the result of the election was favorable.

Since the rat bounty law went into effect, August 1st 1915, the county treasurer's office has paid \$67.15 for dead rats. For February the amount was \$14.70, and the first half of March the amount was \$14.70. From August 1st to March 13th there were 1,343 rats killed and the bounty of 5 cents each paid, and still the rat family is said "holding their own."
