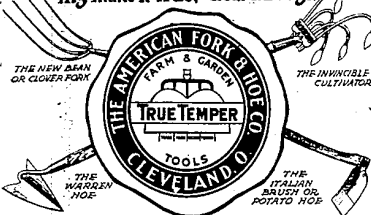

what has heretofore been paid.
