walk in 2 hours and 15 minutes.

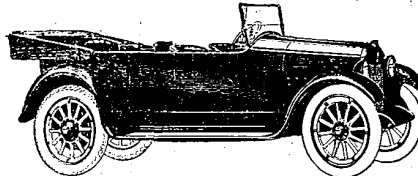
