INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

(By E. O. SULLIVAN, Acting Director of Sunday School Course of the Moody Bible Institute, Chicago.)

**LESSON FOR APRIL 16—
PETER AND CORNELIUS.**

LESSON TEXT—Acts 10:1-2.
GOLDEN TEXT—There is no distinction between Jew and Greek; for the Lord is Lord of all and is rich unto all that call upon him.—Rom. 10:12.

Thus far Christianity had to do with Jews and Jewish proselytes only. Now its circle begins to widen so as to include the Gentiles. The central figure of this lesson, Cornelius, was a captain commanding one hundred men in the Roman army. The chasm between blacks and whites, which so widely exists in America, is nothing compared to that which divided the Jew and Gentile. We take the whole story of Cornelius in today's lesson and consider the Easter story next week.

1. A Prepared Convert (vs. 1-8). (1) His position. Cornelius was a Roman citizen and was the political capital of Judaea. It was about seventy miles from Jerusalem and thence from Joppa. Cornelius, who was captain of a band of men born in Italy, was a Roman citizen and had been connected with the great Roman general Scipio. (2) His character. He was a man of promptness, appreciation and obedience. (vs. 3, 4). He was also a religious man, whose story included the whole household. He was a man of prayer and generosity (vs. 31, 32), for he gave "much alms" to both Jews and Gentiles. The result was that he had become greatly beloved by all, especially by the Jews. It does not seem that Cornelius was a proselyte to the Jewish faith (vs. 28:11-13), and he certainly was not as yet a saved man (11:13).

(4) Cornelius was a man of a vision, not of dreams or of trances, for this vision came in the open daylight (vs. 10), when an angel, looking like a man, appeared upon him. His fear was calmed and he was informed that his prayer for him was a "seeker after God," had been heard. The "memorial" (vs. 4) spoken of was that part of the meal offering which the priest burned upon the altar, which ascended unto the Lord as a sweet savor (See also Mal. 3:16). Cornelius is put to a strange test. He is to send for an unknown man to receive instruction. The angel was not to enlighten him, as he is man's province to witness for God. There is not a recorded Bible conversion without some human instrumentality. Cornelius, soldier that he was, at once obeyed the angel's command and sent two devout retainers after Peter. Man alone could finish the work of the angels.

II. The Prepared Preacher (vs. 9-23). Tanning was considered an unclean occupation, but in Simon's house was the man God wanted to use on this occasion. No matter how poor a preacher, or unlikely the situation, if we obey God we can preach better than Gabriel! God had, as it were, his right hand on Cornelius, and his left upon Peter, and drew them together. Again God uses a dream, linking the natural and the supernatural. A hungry man dreams of food, a very common occurrence, and God gave supernatural direction to a natural dream. God knows the right time to do the right thing. We do not need dreams for our guidance as we have a full and sufficient revelation in the Word for our guidance.

III. The Prepared Ones Meet (vs. 24-33). Cornelius had his whole household ready when Peter arrived (vs. 24). Perhaps most people than on the day of the first great Pentecost. He said, "We are all here present in the sight of God to hear all the things that have been commanded thee of the Lord." This is a great statement. If we consider its full content, Peter refused to accept worship, that alone belongs to God (vs. 25) and he explained how God had thrust him outside of the circle of Jewish believers. He then rehearsed what God had done and asserted that "He is no respecter of persons" and that in response to those in every nation who work righteousness God has sent forth Jesus for the salvation of men. (1) That men might have peace through him (vs. 36); (2) That he might be Lord over all; (3) That he had been anointed with the Holy Spirit and power; (4) That he had been crucified (1 Pet. 1:18, 19; 2:24); (5) That God had raised him from the dead; (6) That he is to be the Judge, and (7) That because of what he had done, "through the name of Jesus"—all that believe shall have "remission of sins." (This is a good sermon outline.) Following this wonderful sermon, there occurred the Pentecost.

Practical. Cornelius had a lack and he went to God to have it supplied (vs. 4). Peter found his enlightenment in prayer.

God revealed his regard for all mankind and that Jesus Christ can and will save all who come to him by faith.

At Caesarea the infant church did accord that the field is the world and that the Pentecost program was for all mankind.

This occasion taught Peter and the church that henceforth, we are to regard all men as brothers and seek to win them for their Savior and ours.

MORE GOOD TABLE THINGS.

Apples are almost always in the market, a fruit which lends itself to many uses, wholesome and appetizing.

Apple Fluff.—Grate a large apple, add a half cupful of sugar and the white of one egg unbeaten, beat until it is stiff enough to stand, place in a glass dish and pour over it a custard made by using the yolk of the egg, two tablespoonfuls of sugar and a cupful of milk, flavor, and after cooking cool before serving.

Prune Putt.—Take a cupful of prunes soaked and cooked until tender, add a teaspoonful of lemon juice, a cupful of flour, five tablespoonfuls of sugar, a half teaspoonful of salt, two tablespoonfuls of melted butter, one teaspoonful of baking powder and one egg and a third of a cupful of milk. Put the prunes in a baking dish and pour the batter over them. Bake in a moderate oven until brown. Cut in squares and serve hot with sweetened and flavored whipped cream.

Pork Cakes.—Take a pound of fat salt pork, chopped fine, pour over it a pint of boiling water, add two cupfuls of sugar, a cupful of molasses and a teaspoonful of soda stirred into it. Add spices to taste and four enough to mix well, adding currants, raisins and citron. A good plan is to bake a small cake to see if it is of the right consistency.

Cabbage With Cream.—Cook a medium-sized cabbage in an open kettle until tender. Drain and lay in a buttered baking dish, pour over it a sauce made of four tablespoonfuls of butter and two of flour, add a cupful of rich milk and a half cupful of rich cream; when the sauce is thick stir in the cheese, and pour over the cabbage, set in the oven to get hot and serve at once.

ALL KINDS OF GOOD THINGS.

The following are some unusual stuffings to use for chicken, duck or turkey:

Rice and Ham Stuffing.—First—Put some cooked ham through a meat chopper; add to a cupful of rice, six chopped mushrooms, a tablespoonful of oil, a half cupful of chopped parsley, salt, pepper, and red pepper to taste, four tablespoonfuls of melted butter and sufficient stock to moisten.

Corn Bread and Nut Stuffing.—Crumb a pint of cornbread, add the grated rind of a lemon, a cupful of finely chopped nuts, two tablespoonfuls of mixed dried herbs, salt and pepper to taste and a half cupful of melted butter. Bacon drippings may be used in place of the butter.

Prunes combined with apples, lemon rind and juice and cooked to a heavy marmalade make a most delicious accompaniment to roast pork.

Cranberry Jelly With Whipped Cream.—Put four cupfuls of cranberries into two quarts of cold water and stew until tender. Strain through a cheesecloth. Measure this liquid, and for each pint add a half cupful of sugar and a tablespoonful of sage. Boil all together until the sage becomes transparent, then pour into a fancy mold and let stand in a cool place twelve hours. When ready to serve turn out on a pretty dish and garnish with sweetened whipped cream.

Fine Cake.—Dissolve a cake of compressed yeast in two cupfuls of lukewarm water, stir into it eight cupfuls of flour, beat until it forms a smooth paste. Cover and let rise for two hours, then add two cupfuls of creamed shortening, two cupfuls of sugar, a half cupful of oil, a pound of shredded citron peel, one and a half pounds of raisins, half a cupful of blanched and shredded almonds and four well-beaten eggs. Fill a large pan half full and bake three and a half hours.

Jam and jelly, if placed sandwich fashion on bread may take the place of cake.
