Not many people know that there is a bill pending in congress to abolish some 50,000 postmasterhips in the United States. Nevertheless such a bill exists, and is receiving strong support from the postmaster general and his deputies at Washington. The plan as outlined by the bill, is to make the postal service of the country a "county unit." None of the present postoffices would be done away with, but, as would be the case in Oakland county, there would be one accounting office at Pontiac, and the office of each of the smaller towns in the county would be a sub station, under the supervision of the county seat office, by an appointed "superintendent." Should this bill become a law there would be only 3000 accounting postoffices in the country, and the smaller cities and villages would lose their postmaster.
