There will be 60 clowns and a big free three mile street parade show day morning.

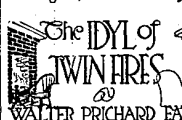

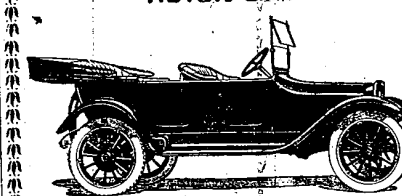

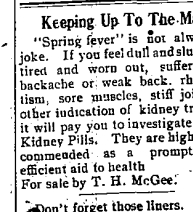
