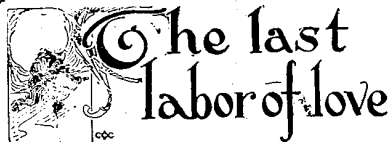

A CHANGE IN POLICY.

Big interests of the country are beginning to realize that publicity in connection with their business operations is the best policy, and that the country newspaper is the best means of letting the public know—"taking the people into their confidence."

For a number of years the D. U. R. has freely discussed all public questions, and corrected the misstatements made regarding the operation and policy of that corporation through their little weekly, Electric Service News, and through the columns of the newspapers along their lines, and have found this policy of inestimable value in the operation of their lines.

Some weeks ago the Bethlehem Steel Company determined to produce an advertising campaign to place before the public its position with reference to the construction of an armor plate works by the national government, and to give their standing regarding this proposal they have sent advertisements, through the American Press-association advertising department, to between three and four thousand country newspapers, the first of which appeared in the Enterprise last week, and the second and third will be found in this issue and that of next week, in which they explain their views in a frank, truthful statement, realizing that "the most effective way of placing their case before the greatest number of people is to buy space in the newspapers of the country."

This company, in the statement of last week, over the signatures of its president and chairman, says that the "mistake of the Bethlehem Steel Company is that it has kept quiet. We shall make the mistake of silence no longer."

Womans' Committee Hold Joint Session For Oakland Centennial work.

On Friday evening, May 24th, a joint session of committees representing the several womans' organizations in the community was held at the home of Mrs. M. B. Price, for the purpose of reporting progress and formulating plans for the part which the women of Farmington township are expected to take in the Oakland county centennial celebration.

The tentative plan is to have a float illustrative of the aims and activities of women, or possibly purely decorative, to lead the Farmington division of the parade on woman's day, followed by the several organizations, carrying flags and banners. The joint committees came to prompt and unanimous decisions on several points, viz., that what the women of Farmington may do should be creditable to themselves and to their town, that they can do more efficient work by combining their forces than for each organization to work alone; that money will be needed to carry out plans of any kind, and that they will raise this money by subscription, asking every woman whose home is in Farmington to give directly what she can, instead of resorting to the usual laborious methods of giving entertainments, dinners, etc.

Forty-one ladies were present, who started the list by giving one dollar each.

Why We Are Opposing A Government Armor Plant

To the People

Some people say that the very fact that the Bethlehem Steel Company is so aggressively fighting the proposal to build a Government armor plant is conclusive proof that the Company is seeking to assure for itself the "vast profits" derived from private manufacture.

The fact is that armor making is the least profitable feature of steel manufacture.

The reason we oppose a Government plant is very simple. It is this:

Even though there is but little profit in the making of armor, we have invested over \$7,000,000 in our armor plant;

That plant is useless for any other purpose; if a Government plant is built the usefulness of our plant is destroyed.

It would be good business for us to make armor for the Government at any price over and above the actual shop cost, RATHER THAN SACRIFICE OUR ENTIRE INVESTMENT.

We do not seek to save big profits; our purpose is very frankly to save our armor plant—itsself built solely for the use of the Government—from going to the scrap heap.

To do that, we are prepared to agree for any period to any terms of manufacture which the Federal Trade Commission shall say absolutely protects the Government of the United States.
