### WILL BE NEUTRAL

Besides the election of National, state and county officers on November 7th next the voters of Michigan will be called upon to decide some important questions, among which is the state wide prohibition issue, this being the first time this question has come before the people of this state in 30 years. The question is an important one and should be thoroughly investigated by every voter in Michigan.

The Enterprise, as the campaign goes on, will endeavor to be entirely neutral, and any matter appearing in our columns relative to either wet or dry will be paid matter and plainly marked "advertisement," and should not be taken as "our opinion or personal feeling in the matter," unless appearing in our editorial column, so kindly remember that whatever the Enterprise contains relative to this important issue is paid for by either the advertisers for the "wets or dries."

The petitions for the submission of the question have been circulated and signed, and will be presented to the secretary of state for filing before July 7th. The anti-saloon league is making a campaign for the amendment to the state constitution providing that the sale and manufacture of all liquors in Michigan shall cease after May 1st, 1918, giving 18 months to adjust matters after the election next fall should the people of the state vote on November 7th to stop the sale of liquors in Michigan.

The question of shipping liquors into the state, should the amendment be carried, and the general plan of enforcement, will be up to the state legislature.

At present there are 43 out of 83 counties in Michigan "dry," under the local option laws and in this territory reside about 40 percent of the population of the state.

The last Prohibition amendment was submitted to the people of Michigan in 1887, and lost by 5,645 votes out of a total of 162,917.

The strongest organization combating the so-called Prohibition movement is the "Michigan Home Rule League," and this body is out with a counter proposition, namely to change the local option unit from the county to the city, village or township, practically placing home rule principles into actual operation. Under such a law all of any county would not have to vote "dry" to stop the licensed sale of liquor in any single community as is the case at the present time. This proposition will also be on the ballots for the initial to the voters at the November election.

So during this campaign along with the tariff, our new friend Preparedness and our old chum, American Rights, the subject of Boozie will be poured into the people in all forms, as professional agitators will no doubt be attracted here from all parts of the country by the campaign funds raised by push, defend and defeat both of these measures.

The Preparedness League of American Dentists, with headquarters in Buffalo, N.Y., has opened a registration bureau in the hope of enrolling twenty thousand dentists who will each one agree to prepare, free of charge, during the month of at least one applicant to meet the requirements for enlistment in the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps, and subject to such rules as shall protect them against its position. The standard of enlistment for the United States Marine Corps requires the applicant to have at least twenty sound teeth, with four opposed molars and four opposed incisors. Properly filled teeth are counted as sound, and many men now rejected for defective teeth will be saved to the "First Line of De-

fense," by the patriotic members of the Dentists' Preparedness League, is the belief of league officials.
