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TOOK A FLYING LEAP

Big Motor Truck Ran off En bankment at the Foot of the McGee Hill.

Early Mouday morning a big Reliance truck was being driven Brighton Argus. down the McGee hill, when according to the story of the driver, the brakes refused to work, and the machine gained a terriffic speed ching the turn at the foot of the hill.

In trying to turn the corner the driver evidently lost control of his wheel. Then the machine plunged off the left hand side of the road, crashed into the fence above the abutme, t of the old bridge, carry-ing part of the stones with it, and stiking the ground six or eight feet from the road, with a drop of ford Leader. about eight feet.

Fortunately the truck remained right side up, narrowly missing the big electric light pole, its force carrying it some 30 feet into the field.

No one was seriously injured and the 'nachine was only slightly damaged.

The gren with the truck, who had bee; drawing tile, took a trolly to Detroit, and on 'Wednesday another (ruck came out, hitched a block and tackle to the truck and light pole, and pulled the machine up the bank into the road, and up to Grand River, where the motor was started and the truck driven to Detroit under its own power.

Had the truck left the road two or three feet further to the northwest it would have goue down some to or 12 feet, and probably turned, a complete somersatult. On the other hand, two feet further to the southeast would have taken it into the big light pole. Altogether it
