SHOULD PULL TOGETHER

The average farmer is ready to co-operate with his town brethren, but he wants to co-operate in his own way and in something that he can clearly see is to his interest. A study of what has been termed co-operation as it has existed for many years between town and country people generally shows that the town has developed the plan and presented it to the farmer full formed. A better way to co-operate would be for the town and the country to get together. Let both indicate what they want in the way of co-operation; then together work out the problem—not in any patronizing way; but in a substantial business-like manner as between partners with a common interest.

Full and free co-operation between town and country to the mutual benefit of both is not impossible, but if it ever is accomplished it may have to be at the sacrifice of some of the artificial machinery which thrives in towns unnecessary to the economic scheme yet capable of gaining and keeping a foothold. The occasional "farmers' day" in the village or city is a very desirable thing and these events should be encouraged. An occasional village or city men's day in the country might not be a bad innovation, but the permanent solution of the problem of co-operation between town and country is not found in the occasional special event which brings the two groups of men together. Real co-operation must be continuous and must be of a kind which directly effects the farmer's prosperity and leaves more money in his pocket at the end of the year. When the farmers in any territory, with or without town co-operation, are able to put their business on a basis which will earn 3 per cent instead of 1 per cent, the producing department will need a good purchasing department and an even more elaborate sales department, which is another way of saying that the prosperous farmer will make a prosperous town.—Michigan Investor.

SLOW TO FORGET HATRED

Women, It is Said, Will Remember a Wrong Much Longer Than Will a Man.

Reports from Berlin refer to the "vindictive hatred" of the German women for their country's foes. From the soldiers home from the front come words of respect, even of praise, for their adversaries in arms, but the women nurse their enmity; theirs is "haughty Juno's unrelenting hate," and they freely express it.

The fact only proves that German women are "sisters under the skin" with the women of other nations. Is feminine hatred of the enemy more intense in Unter den Linden than in the Champs Elysees or in London's West End? We doubt it. Woman's capacity for hate is equalled only by her capacity for love. Her deeper depths of affection are matched by depths of enmity, where her emotions are profoundly stirred, unknown to man. Men, individually and in the aggregate, fight and forgive. But with the women the offense rankles long after the physical wounds are healed.

Hatred is not a new feminine attribute, nor is it local to any country. The women of Berlin are no better haters than were the women of the South in the Civil war or the women of Rome and Athens centuries before. Hatred has been a sex prerogative since the beginning of history, and its possession is what makes women in the broader sense the best patriots. There is a theory that women would put an end to war if they had the determining voice. That is a hypothesis of doubtful soundness.

Few women are pacific at heart, and though the development of political consciousness has made them more keenly appreciative of the terrible price they pay for war, the proposition is a long way from proof that they would abolish it if they could.

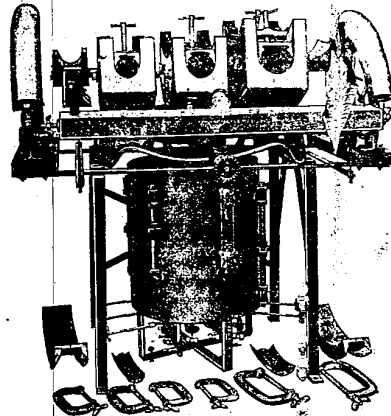
