FARM HOME William Wedow Had Been a Member of Farmington Lodge, F. & A. M. Over 40 Years

William Wedow died at the home of his son, Albert, in Novi, last Monday, July 10, 1916, after an illness of nearly two years, aged 76 years, 7 months and 27 days. Mr. Wedow was born in Meckle-

berg, Germany, on November 13 1839, and came to this country when 26 years old coming directly to this county, where he settled on a farm in Novi township, on which he lived for 30 years, coming to thi village some four years ago where he resided until April last, when he and his wife returned to the farm and were erecting a small home fo themselves when death overtook him

Mr. Wedow was a man well known in this vicinity and of ster ing character, and a member of the Farmington Lodge, F. & A. M.

for over 40 years. Besides his wife, he is survived by four sons, John E., Charles and Albert, of Novi; William of Franklin; one daughter, Mrs. Austin Owen, of Detroit, and many friends

A Pointer for Merchants

The advertising manager of one of the higgest mail order houses in the country, in a talk before members of an advertising club recently gave some interesting informtion on how they secured much of their buisiness He said:

"We have a bureau whose duty it is to read each week the county newspapers from all over the country There is not a paper of any conse quence in our trade territory tha our bureau does not get.

This bureau looks over these papers and when we find a town where the merchants are not ad-vertising in the local paper, we immediately flood the territory with our literature. It always brings results far in excess of the same effort put forth in territory where local merchants use their local paper."

Took a Sudden Bath.

While driving near the Coleman farm last Saturday Glenn White lost ontrol of his machine while crossing the Creek, and plunged off the oridge into the water and mud of the creek, the machine turning en tirely upside down.
