Teachers' Examination.

The next regular teachers' examination for Oakland county will be held at the Crofoot school on West Haron street, Pontiac, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 10, 11 and 12, 1916, opening at 8:30 a. m. central standard time, of each day. Applicants may write for first, second third grade certificates at this examination.
The examination in reading for the August examination is based on "Ode to Nightingale," by Keats.
Examination will be given in the following subjects, as indicated in the program:

FIRST DAY
Morning: Orthography and spelling; Arithmetic, mental and written; Theory and Application of Fractions.
Afternoon: Geography; Civil Government; United States History.
SECOND DAY
Morning: Grammar; Physiology; Reading.
Afternoon: Penmanship; Agriculture; School Law; State Course of Study; Geometry (first grade).
THIRD DAY
Morning: Algebra; Botany; General History (second grade); Physics (second grade).
Afternoon: General History; Physics. An average standing of 65 per cent with a minimum standing of 50 per cent is required for third grade certificates. An average standing of 75 per cent with a minimum standing of 70 per cent is required for second grade certificates. Seventy-five per cent is required for all grades of certificates in arithmetic, grammar, orthography and spelling.

Applicants who have taken the reading test at summer schools are excused from writing on the subjects of Theory and Art and Reading.
All candidates for certificates must register 10 days in advance of the examination. Registration cards may be had from the school commissioner's office. Transfer certificates can only be granted by the board of examiners at the regular board meeting. Applicants for transfers must file their examination papers with the commissioner on or before the August examination.
All papers for transfer certificates must meet the standard required for an Oakland county certificate. Only second grade certificates can be transferred. Teachers cannot sign contracts until they hold a legal certificate.
All candidates must come prepared to write with pen and ink.
All applicants for certificates must be 18 years of age at the time of the examination.
Act No. 7 amends section 6 of Act No. 147 of the Public Acts of 1911 which provides for the examination and certification of teachers. This amendment provides that no certificate shall be granted under the provisions of this act to any person who shall not have completed a term of at least six weeks' work in professional training in a state normal school or in one of the county normal training classes of the state or in any normal training school conducted by any municipality in the state or in any school approved by the state superintendent of public instruction; but the completion of one-half year of work in a school maintaining four years of work above high school rank may be accepted in lieu of this requirement. This provision, however, shall not apply to persons who have completed a term of this state for at least five months prior to July 1, 1916. Provided further, that no certificate shall be granted under the provisions of this act to any person who, having arrived at the age of 21 years, is not a citizen of the United States.
