Around the County

The September term of circuit court opens the 11th, with 13 criminal cases on the docket.

Mrs. Charles Kent, of Novi, died last Friday morning, death being caused by a paralytic stroke the previous Sunday. She had been ill for a year.

The West Farmington Unity club met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Smith last Friday evening for their annual meeting. A two-part farce was given, interspersed with vocal and instrumental music, and a delightfully arranged supper served. Over 90 guests were present, and a most enjoyable time participated in.

Jacob Kopynsky, a junk dealer of Pontiac, was held up and robbed of a \$75 gold watch, \$13 in money and a \$10 gold piece made into a charm, while driving with his wife and a lady friend on the streets of Pontiac last Saturday night.
