D. U. R. to Have New Freight Shed in Detroit.

Officials of the D. U. R. lines have appounced that the old freight shed at the west side of Congress and Fifth street will be vacated, and a new one erected for in bound and out bound freights on property recently acquired by the company, bound by Macomb and Mouroe, Dequindry and Chene

streets—on the east side.

The new structures will cost \$1, 000,000, and will provide all mod-ern improvements along this line of of work. The site of the new freight terminal is now occupied by the D. U. R. repair shops. buildings are to be torn down and new ones erected as soon as possi It may of interest to know that the Detroit United lines have 43 motor cars, 31 trailer cars, a locomotive and two cabooses en-

gaged in handling its freight traffic. Last year the gross earnings vere approximately \$800,000 from freight business. The express freight cars are operated mostly at night, making 34 schedule trips daily into the territory surrounding
