### Judge Rockwell

(Orieo Review)

In connection with the announcement of Judge K. P. Rockwell's candidacy for another term as probate judge, it gives this paper great satisfaction editorially, to voice the general approval which the people of the county stand ready to give the splendid administration of one of the most important of our county offices, at the August primary and November election.

Judge Rockwell has a genial personality which has made for himself sincere friendships among all who have come in contact with him, either in a social, business or administrative way.

But as a judge, responsible for the handling of estates totaling in value very closely those of the

largest county of the state, he has established a reputation for fairness and correct judicial decisions not to be surpassed in the state, and here we may say that the judge has never had one of his decisions finally reversed by the upper courts.

Under Judge Rockwell the expenses of probating the estates coming before the court have been decreased over that of former years, saving on items which have been of direct benefit to widows and orphans who are obliged to take, oftentimes, small properties through this court. A saving that has often been a genuine boon at a time when the interested parties needed the fullest benefit possible from the meager estate evolved. Personally the writer could point to many such cases coming under his own observation.

Another commendable feature of Judge Rockwell's administration is his handling of the juvenile problem which the state puts up to the probate courts of the state, and here in Oakland county the position of the judge is that children coming to this court at an age when their future making, or undoing, is possibly a life issue, that they be not treated as criminals but be given

help and a chance to regain their lost foothold, a position which is so greatly admired by the people and one that has worked out with so great benefit in cases without number.

Judge Rockwell has held with excellent satisfaction the office of prosecuting attorney, re-elected on his record as many times as he was willing to serve the people in that capacity, has been recognized and honored by his associates by the presidency of the state association of probate judges. He is now serving as probate judge for the second term, and we predict, if he will consent, that our people, recognizing the benefit of ripe judgement and experience, will treat Oakland county's probate judge as Wayne county has Judge Durfee, who has been continued at the head of their probate court for over forty years.

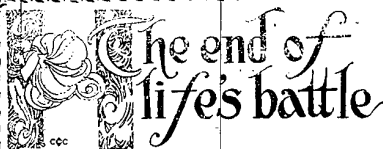

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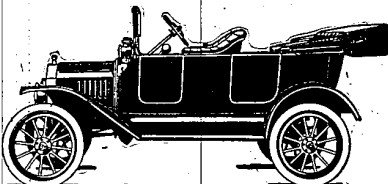
