BETTER QUALITY OF BUTTER

Article Sells on its Merits as to Flavor, Tasts and Color—Control Flavors and Odors.

Butter is used primarily to improve the palatability of foods for human consumption. It sells on its merits as to taste, davor and color, though some are influenced by its texture. Color may be produced artificially in a way to please the most particular person and it therefore becomes of secondary importance to the producer; it does not imply quality, but oftimes a rich color will compensate for a lack of other qualities.
