pounds. Total, 333.20 pounds, making 33 loaves of 16 ozs. each.
Figure this at 5c per loaf.

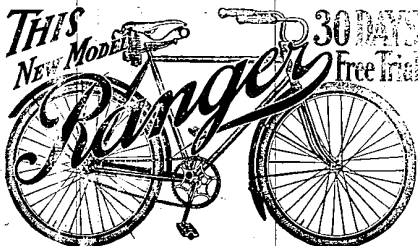
