DEMOCRATS SWEEP STATE OF UTAH

Salt Lake.—Woodrow Wilson has carried Ulah by about 15,5,0 plurality. United States Senator George Sutherland, republican, has been defeated by Judge William H. King. Simon Bamberger, democrat, has been elected governor, and the entire democratics state ticket swept the state. Both democratic candidates for congress were elected. Mr. Bamberger is the first democratic and the first non-Mormon to be elected governor of Utah. Glenn Miller, republican state challman, sald: "President Wilson has contried the state by more than 5,00%, and the indications are that Senator Sutherland is beaten. We hope to save the governor."
