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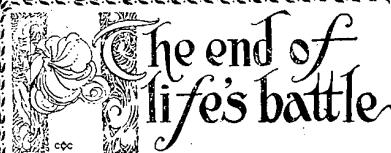

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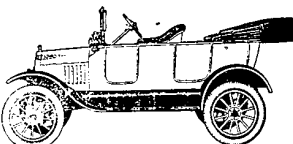

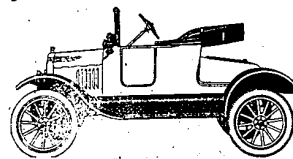

MICHIGAN'S LOSS.

In the death of Lawton T. Hemans, of Mason, Michigan has lost a valued citizen, and the Democratic party one of its foremost leaders.

Mr. Hemans came into the public eye in 1901, when he was elected to the state legislature from the second district of Ingham county. He represented his county in the constitutional convention in 1907. Was twice the nominee of his party for governor of Michigan, being defeated by our townsman Fred M. Warner, and also by Chase S. Osborn, who appointed him as a member of the state railroad commission, which term would have expired on January 1, 1917. It is said the governor elect, Albert E. Sleeper contemplated the re-appointment of Mr. Hemans. Among his last expressed words was a wish for the welfare of Michigan.
