# Finally...RU Breaks 7 Game Drought

Redford Union's luckless football season took a turn to better in the Suburban Eight finale with Dearborn.

After dropping seven contests, the Panthers knocked off Dearborn, 20-14, to finish at 1-6 in the league and hopefully are ready for their annual clash with Thurston Saturday.

"It was a long time coming," said RU Coach Bob Atkins after the Dearborn triumph. "But in those first seven losses, we played only three halves of bad football and those against Bentley, Plymouth and Edsel Ford."

"Other than those three we have played good solid football. The ball just hasn't been bouncing our way but the kids have hung in there and showed what they are made of."

The first RU score against Dearborn was set up by a Dale Long pass interception which gave the Panthers possession on their 49. Nine plays later, RU quarterback Dave Smith connected with Glenn Sander on an eight-yard six-point play.

George Willard converted and it was 14-0.

A 35-yard field goal attempt by Willard in the closing seconds of the first half fell short and after 21 minutes of football, RU still led, 7-0.

It remained that way until early in the final quarter. Mike Hallisey picked off a stray RU pass on his own 33 and Dearborn pranced to the RU 26 where Scott O'Grady intercepted a Dearborn pass.

His return to Dearborn's 15 and the interception were nullified on a roughing the passer call and it was first down on the RU 20. Frank Yesh broke loose for the distance on the following play, Bob Knoop converted and it was tied at seven-all.

Following the kickoff, RU ran one play and fumbled.

The Panther defense stymied Dearborn and Tim Clements returned a punt 26 yards to the Dearborn 23. RU marched in on five plays with a assist to Sander passing setting up a Tom Bogdonas seven-yard spur to paydirt. Willard converted to make it 14-7.

The RU defense held again and the Panthers went to work with Bogdonas capping a 48-yard four-play drive of his own on dashes of 30, eight, eight and two yards setting it to 20-7, with 4:45 remaining.

But Dearborn kept with the tempo set in the fourth quarter as Yesh returned the kickoff 88 yards. Knoop converted and it was 20-14.

A Bogdonas 47-yard kick return went for naught as RU fumbled on its first play and Dearborn took over on the Panther 45, four minutes remaining.

Middle guard Dave White came up with the big play

and stopped Dearborn on a fourth down situation, giving the ball back to RU's which ground out the clock for victory No. 1.

RU won the rushing game, 141 yards to 50, and collected 12 first downs to Dearborn's four. Smith hit on six of 11 passes for 52 yards and Dearborn was held to three of 12 for 42 yards.

Bogdonas was the leading rusher with 123 yards in 26 carries. The 5-9, 175-pound senior back has totaled 829 yards in 147 attempts along with scoring seven touchdowns.

Now comes the Redford Township "backyard battle."

"Thurston is an up and down team," commented Atkins. "You know, what's funny about this game is that they (Thurston) look at this game at a real rival level while we don't."

"Our kids aren't as interested in this one. We get

more excited about our games with Trenton and Edsel Ford. I don't really know why, but that's the way it is. Hopefully they will get excited about this one. It ought to be a good backyard scrap. It will be a matter of giving out a black eye or taking one."

# Raiders Down Hawks, 16-6

# North Topples Harrison

North Farmington came up with a strong second half to thwart any upset hopes rival Harrison might have had.

After a scoreless first half, it wound up North 16, Harrison 6.

The Raiders gow sport a 6-1 mark while Harrison slipped to 4-3.

Five pass interceptions, one fumble recovery and a 14-yard touchdown romp called back because of a penalty was the story of the first half.

Bob Miller, Paul Rogind and Dave Thorne all intercepted North passes. North's Brad Pease had a six-pointer called back with 5:23 remaining in the second quarter.

On a fourth down and six play, Pease lofted a 29-yard scoring toss on a halfback play only to have it nullified when it was found North had an illegal receiver downfield.

On a drive started from its own 44 with 4:21 left in the third quarter, North finally got on the board with only nine seconds elapsed in the final quarter.

Jeff Lindberg split the up-rights from 37 yards out and the Raiders were up, 3-0.

Then, only 57 seconds later, North scored again as

Jim Fredericks intercepted a Harrison pass and sprinted 23 yards to paydirt. The conversion missed but the margin was up to nine points.

Harrison came right back with it's "captain Jack" play with Dave Thorne sprinting 67 yards for six points. North was caught sleeping and after three quarters without a score, 15 points were on the board in two minutes with North still in command, 9-6.

A pass interception halted Harrison's next drive with North's Pease taking over and marching the Raiders to a game tying score. Pease went in from seven yards out and upped his game output to 104 yards. Lindberg converted to make it 16-6.

# Falcons Halt Southfield

Farmington High tuned up for its city rival clash with North Farmington in a 19-14 victory over the Blue Jays of Southfield.

It was Southfield's homecoming and the Falcons were out to spoil the festivity. Farmington collected 10 first downs to Southfield's 14. Kevin Ratliff paced the Farmington 200 - yard rushing game with 35 yards in 10 carries.

Southfield's 169 yards on the ground was headed by Ken McNamee with 100 yards in 25 rushes.

The aerial attacks saw Farmington hit on three of five for 27 yards and the Blue Jays five of 16 for 43 yards.

After a Farmington fumble on its own 30, a 17-yard scoring toss from Steve Jusino to Ed Holton and a Sal Rizzo conversion gave Southfield a 7-0 lead.

Farmington struck back with a 56-yard march, Ken DiRocco going in from the one. Bob Drake converted and it was tied at seven - all early in the second.

Farmington played ball - control football the final quarter and ran 19 plays to Southfield's six to offset the 132 yards they picked up in penalties compared to only 19 by Southfield.

But Farmington played a 137 haltime lead, a crowd-plunge by Brian Ratliff capping a 66 yard drive.

A 56-yard fumble recovery dash by Kevin Ratliff halted Farmington's margin to 15-7 midway in the third quarter. Southfield bounced back with Jusino hitting Al Kutz on an eight yarder and Rizzo converting to 46-14 to 19-14 after three quarters.

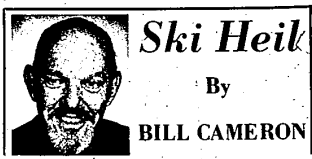

How about skiing in a foreign country this season? Although you may not think of Canada as a "foreign" country, you'll find excellent snow conditions, exciting runs, and atmosphere that's comparable to many resorts found in Europe.

You can hop an Air Canada flight and be in the Canadian Rockies in a few hours, landing in either Calgary or Edmonton, ready to ski to Jasper, Lake Louise, Banff areas amid some of the most spectacular scenery found anywhere in the world.

The world famous 600-room Banff Springs Hotel is now open year around. In one week you can ski Marmot Basin in Jasper, Lake Louise's Whitehorn Temple and Banff's Sunshine and Mount Norquay. My son made the trip last year and still talks about it.

If you would like to sample a little French atmosphere, head east to Quebec where you'll find 639 ski slopes, 494 miles of slopes, 292 ski towns and lifts and hundreds of restaurants with great French cuisine. With names like

Mont Tremblant, Saint-Jovite, Sainte-Agathe-des-Monts, Mont Gabriel, I would imagine the area would be a gourmet's paradise. The Laurentians have long been one of the most popular ski areas in North America.

If you would prefer something closer to home, ski Ontario. A five hour drive will take you to Collingwood where you will find enjoyable skiing at Blue Mountain Winter Park, Georgian Peaks or over to Kimberly at Tallisman.

In fact, there are more than 100 ski areas in Ontario alone. You will find good roads all the way. Of course, if you are smart you will plan on spending one or two days in Toronto on the way back. The same holds true for Montreal. They are definitely fun cities.

If you would like information on skiing in Canada, just contact the Air Canada office or the Canadian Government Tourist Bureau on Washington Blvd. in Detroit. They will even give you the weather conditions and snow reports from all the areas.
