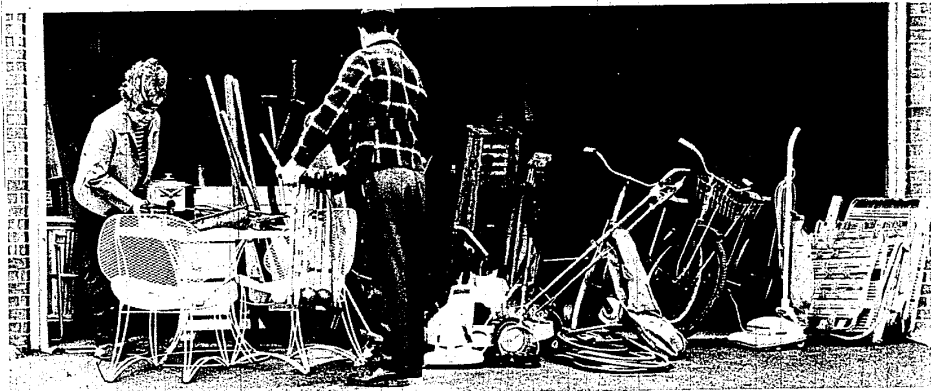
### SORROWS SENIOR CITIZENS
