After a great start Mike Mason fell off a bit in his last two games and had to settle for a 711 count at Bel-Aire. He opened with a 226, then dropped to 229 and closed with a 226.

Lois Merriman was up to her old tricks at Livonia Ladies when she had counts of 187, 171 and 189 for a 547. One of the younger members, Joan Ison, had an even 200.

Tom Hay showed the way in the Farmington Lanes Mixed Classic with a 234 in 622 and Mary Randall paced the women with a 206 in 566.

In the Teen Classic it was Kathy Allen with 216 and Don Hunt with a 215 in 569.

Marion Thayer reached double century figures at Mayflower Lanes with a 206 to beat out Beverly Schetty with 593 and Joan Porta with 517.

Opening night honors in the top league at Oak Park lanes went to Dennis Miller with a 497 gained on games of 221, 223 and 203.

This is a banner season for Emil Wansa, one of the best known of the veteran pin spillers.

For the second time within three weeks he topped 700 in the Wonderland Classic. This time it was a 710, but he had to bow to Bill McKee who paced the loop with a 712.

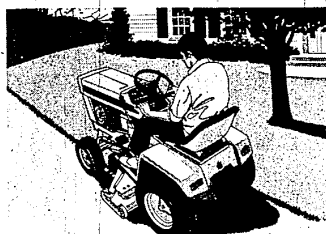
