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Plymouth Symphony Undergoes Changes

Dr. Richard Kirchgatter, the young veterinarian who is president of the symphony society, announced several innovations for the Observers' oldest orchestra:

- Opening program will be on a Thursday (Oct. 11) at 8 p.m., although other concerts will be on the traditional Sunday afternoons at 4.
- The orchestra will go on tour. The Oct. 11 program will be repeated Oct. 14 at Grand Valley State College, Allendale, where Dunlap is

head of the music department. Soloist will be pianist Richard Syracuse, whose Romantic bravura was demonstrated in last year's opening program with the Liszt first concerto. This time, he will perform Beethoven's fourth concerto.

• K-12 students will be admitted free at four of the six concerts. The only exceptions will be the Christmas season offering of Handel's "The Messiah" with the Kenneth Jewell Chorus and the Severo Ballet performance of "Giselle" in March. Students below sixth grade must be accompanied by a parent.

• Senior citizens residing in Tonguish Creek Manor will

be picked up by a bus and given free transportation to the concerts, beginning about 45 minutes before concert time. All concerts will be in Plymouth's Salem High School, Joy Road west of Canton Center Road.

• Except for the Oct. 11 concert, babysitting services by qualified girl scouts will be available.

• Tickets will be available at the door for the four "regular" concerts—Oct. 11, Nov. 18, Jan. 27, and April 21. For the Dec. 9 "Messiah" and March 10 "Giselle," it is advisable for non-members of the Plymouth Symphony Society to purchase tickets in advance at either Heide's Flowers or Melody House in downtown Plymouth.

• This year's membership drive is being conducted in fall, a little closer to the concert season, rather than in

Livonia Youth Turns Pro

Livonia now has one of the youngest professional symphony musicians in the United States.

Paul Randall, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Randall of Norwich Road, will be playing assistant first trumpet in the New Orleans Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra.

The orchestra opens its season in New Orleans Theater of the Performing Arts, Tuesday, Sept. 25.

Randall attended Livonia's Stevenson High School where he was active in the wind ensemble, the orchestra and the award-winning jazz ensemble. This year he received the John Philip Sousa

award at the school's honors night.

He has also appeared with the Metropolitan Wind Quintet, the Village Chamber Players and in the pit at many musical comedy productions in the metropolitan area.

Randall has studied with such well-known trumpet men as Roger Voisin and Armando Ghitalla of the Boston Symphony Orchestra and Bernard Adelstein, principal trumpet of the Cleveland Orchestra.

Randall began studying trumpet with teacher Irving Sarin of Westland at the age of 11. Within a year he was a member of the Livonia Junior Orchestra, where he

won a scholarship enabling him to attend the Schoecraft Summer Music School in 1969 and 1970.

At 14 he appeared as soloist with the Schoecraft Court Orchestra in a performance of Aaron Copland's "Quiet City." Randall was also first chair trumpet in the All-State Intermediate Orchestra at Interlochen.

When the Detroit Symphony Youth Orchestra was formed in 1970, Randall was chosen as principal trumpet and played three seasons. He also became principal trumpet with the Detroit Metropolitan Orchestra and the Dearborn Symphony Orchestra.
