

North Crushes Central, 27-0

If North Farmington football Coach Ron Holland had any doubts as to how fast his crew would pick up the slack resulting from the teachers' strike, they were quickly dispelled in the opening hills against Walled Lake Central.

One scrimmage and one regular season clash late, the Raiders clobbered Walled Lake Central, 27-0. Central was not off a blanking in its opening match a week prior but on the opposite end of the score, 44-0.

"I really wasn't sure how the kids were going to react," stated Holland, whose crew is expected to give

Franklin a battle for the Northwest title. "Enthusiasm was just bubbling over. I have never had kids that wanted to play as much as these."

North jumped into the scoring column the second time it got its hands on the ball. After a short punt, North's All-Area Brad Pease capped a 35-yard drive with a three-yard burst. Jeff Lemberg made good the point after and the Raiders were up, 7-0.

The second North score came with 1:31 remaining in the opening half when Mike Daley galloped 25 yards on a

quarterback draw call. Lemberg converted and it was 14-0 at the half.

A 65-yard march for North early in the third quarter pushed it to 21-0. Pease hit pay-dirt on a 16-yard spurt and Lemberg converted.

North's final six-point play came later in the quarter with a poor punt giving the Raiders control on Central's 40 yard line. Bill Lough highlighted the drive with a 13-yard dash into the end

zone. The kick was blocked but a North victory was intact.

Central's deepest penetration came in the fourth quarter when it got as far as North's 10 before Steve Kotecki intercepted a pass.

North totaled 14 first downs, all rushing, to only six by Central. Pease led the Raider ground game with 112 yards in 26 carries followed by Daley with 82 yards in 10 carries with North pounding

out 280 total. Daley was one for four in the air for seven yards.

Central was held to 93 yards in the air on seven of 15 passes and a minus seven on the ground with quarterback Mike Imhoff getting sacked eight times by the North line.

North opens Northwest action Friday against defending league champion Garden City East on the East gridiron at 8 p.m.

Harrison Routs Groves In Grid Opener, 41-0

It was the pre-season scrimmage, game No. 1 and game No. 2 all rolled into one for Farmington Harrison.

"The Hawks rolled it all together and barreled over Birmingham Groves for a 41-0 season opener which had been delayed by the teachers' strike."

Harrison's one allotted scrimmage was nullified along with the scheduled opener with rival Farmington.

"I was really surprised that we executed our plays as well as we did," commented Coach John Herrington. "It appears that the strike didn't hurt us too

much but I know it didn't help us."

"The kids were hungry to play," he added. "Games were taken away from them and they want to play."

Harrison drew blood the first time it went on offense with Chuck Yarbner scoring his first of three touchdowns on a 35 yard spurt to cap a 55 yard march. Jim Harkin made good the kick and it was 7-0.

A Sam Pink three yard plunge pushed it to 14-0 in the quarter with Harkin again converting.

Quarterback Mike Crudele increased it to a three touchdown margin in the second

with a one yard burst. Harkin made good and it stood 21-0 at the half.

Yarbner went to work in the third quarter, scoring on a three yard run and 70 yard punt return. A Paul Rogind conversion made it 34-0.

Pink dashed off an 11 yard TD run in the fourth and Rogind added a point after to climax the Hawk attack. Meanwhile the Harrison defense kept Groves in check and allowed them past the 50 only once.

Yarbner paced the Harrison's 273 yard rushing game with 108 yards in 19 carries.

TO THE GAS CUSTOMERS OF CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY NOTICE OF HEARING ON MOTION FOR PARTIAL AND IMMEDIATE GAS RATE RELIEF

On April 18, 1973, Consumers Power Company filed an application with the Michigan Public Service Commission with supporting testimony and exhibits in Case No. U-4331, which requests authority to amend its gas rates so as to increase its gas revenues by approximately \$50,400,000 on an annual basis and, at the same time, Consumers Power Company filed a Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief which seeks authority, on an interim basis, to amend its gas rates so as to increase its gas revenues by approximately \$33,729,000 on an annual basis. On August 27, 1973, Consumers Power Company also filed a Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief in its pending electric rate proceeding, Case No. U-4332. At the hearing hereinafter noticed, the motion for partial and immediate electric rate relief, Case No. U-4332, will be heard concurrently with the motion for partial and immediate gas rate relief, Case No. U-4331. In its motion, Consumers Power Company has stated the substantial increases in the cost of capital, gas, taxes, wages, equipment, materials and supplies have had a serious adverse impact upon the earnings level of its gas business and that it has not been able to attain the level of earnings in its gas business found to be reasonable in the prior gas rate order of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

The Michigan Public Service Commission has scheduled a hearing on the motions for partial and immediate rate relief filed in Case Nos. U-4331 and U-4332 and has ordered that notice be given that:

A. A public hearing on Consumers Power Company's motions for partial and immediate gas and electric rate relief will commence at 9:30 a.m. on October 8, 1973 in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, and will continue, if necessary, on the succeeding days of the

week of October 8 at the same location and at such time as shall be determined by the presiding officer until the matter has been fully heard.

B. The parties who have already intervened in the above-entitled proceedings shall be entitled to participate as parties in the hearing on Consumers Power Company's motions for partial and immediate rate relief. Any additional persons or entities seeking to intervene for the purpose of participating in the hearing on the motions for partial and immediate rate relief shall file with the Commission, five (5) days prior to October 8, 1973, an original and eleven copies of the petition to intervene with proof of service upon Consumers Power Company and the other parties to this proceeding. A service list can be obtained from the Secretary of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913.

C. The interim rate increases described in this notice have been requested by Consumers Power Company. The Michigan Public Service Commission may either grant or deny the requested increases, or may grant lesser or greater increases than those requested.

Jurisdiction of the Commission in this matter is pursuant to Section 4 of Act 419, PA 1919, as amended (MCLA § 460.54); Sections 4, 6 and 6a of Act 3, PA 1939, as amended (MCLA § 460.4, 460.6, 460.6a); and the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, 1954 Administrative Code, as amended, No. 54, R 460.11 et seq.
