'Ape' Bombs Out As Film

Desmond Morris' "The Naked Ape" may have been a best-selling book, but the movie version is far from a box office success.

"The Naked Ape," a story about man's evolution, traces his development from 10 million years ago to tomorrow with the integration of live action and animation.

Johnny Crawford, of the old "Ritman" series, has the starring role — as what I'm not sure. But I'm inclined to think it was modern man's version of the ape.

The action begins in a jungle during a war. A discussion of man and ape takes place between Crawford and his buddy, Dennis Oliveri.

The scenes that follow during the next 80 minutes are confusing. Much of that time is taken up by discussions of sexual behavior patterns of man and ape.

Crawford and his girlfriend, Victoria Principal, act out the human part in a college campus setting.

The ape, or prehistoric man, acts out his part through animation during prehistoric times.

Based on audience response, the animated scenes scored much higher than the live ones.

As the film draws to an end, the scene shifts back to the jungle war. There the action ends for Crawford as well as the viewer.

Producer Zev Bufman's idea of such a man and ape comparison was a good one. However, Director Donald Driver, who also wrote the screenplay, just plain didn't get it all together on film.

'73 Duck Season

Michigan's 1973 duck season has been set for Oct. 10-Nov. 30 under a daily 100-point system of regulating hunter take, as the result of action announced by the state Natural Resources Commission.

The commission, acting on waterfowl hunting options offered by the U.S. Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, also placed the state's upcoming goose season at Oct. 1-Nov. 30 in the upper and northern lower peninsula and at Oct. 10-Nov. 30 in the southern lower peninsula.

The 1973 duck season will be five days shorter than the 50-day season of 1972. Habitat deterioration in Canadian breeding areas prompted the decision to shorten the season, say Department of Natural Resources' wildlife officials, noting that this fall's flight is expected to be down 30 per cent from last year's.

Limited hunting of canvasbacks and redheads will be allowed this year.

The counties where hunting or taking canvasbacks or redheads will be forbidden this year include Bay, Huron, Macomb, Monroe, Muskegon, St. Clair, Tuscola and Wayne. The rest of the state will be open for hunting of both species.

As in the past, this fall's point system will give the highest rating—thus greatest protection—to those birds in shortest supply, with canvasbacks and redheads each granted 100 points.

Under the daily limit of 100 points a day, each of the following point values:

Hen mallard, black duck, wood duck and hooded merganser, 50 points; drake mallard, pintail, ringneck, goldeneye, bufflehead, oldsquaw, ruddy, 25 points; all other ducks, including the other merganser species, 15 points apiece.

As a sporting plus to this fall's regular duck season and its point system, Michigan again will have a special season on scup, running this year from Nov. 24 through Dec. 9. The special hunt, set with limits of five scup a day and 10 in possession, will cover selected waters and marshes, with specific locations to be determined later this week.

This fall's goose season will carry a bag limit of five geese a day and five in possession, following last year's basic format. However, as part of that quota, the daily take on Canada geese is again limited to one, with the possession limit for Canada geese also established at one.

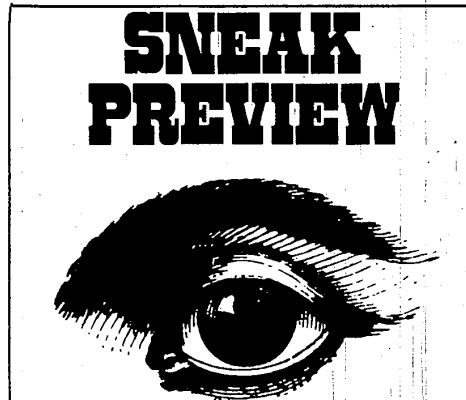
