Thurston High cross-country Coach Ray Williams couldn't have asked for a more perfect performance from his Eagle three-milers.

His harriers scored two shutout triumphs over Oak Park, 15-50, and Farmington Harrison, 15-47.

The Oak Park win was the first league encounter in the Northwest Suburban and the Harrison match pushed the overall Eagle record to 4-1.

Paul Benedict captured first place honors in the Oak Park meet with a 16:17 clocking followed by Lou

Torolacci, at 16:20, Dan Graustein at 16:52, Jerry Merritt at 17:05 and Bob Wilson at 17:08.

Thurston also took sixth and seventh place with Eric Forbes clocking in at 17:07 and Lou Moceranti at 17:47. Sid Chiot was the first to

cross the line for the Oak Park Redskins in eighth with a time of 18:27.

The non-league victory over Harrison featured a three-way Thurston tie for first between Graustein, Torolacci and Benedict, all hitting the string at 17:55, fol-

lowed by teammates Forbes at 17:42 and Wilson at 17:54.

Harrison's front five was headed by Hutchinson in sixth (18:23), Hrukay in eighth (18:30), Wuner in 10th (19:00), Fumer in 11th (20:33) and Nelson in 12th (20:34).
