## Bridge Hand Too Much Talking

The auction is supposed to be an exchange of information... sometimes you can exchange so much information that the opponents get the better of it than you:

There was absolutely nothing to the play: declarer ruffed the club opening, cashed H A, ruffed another club, ruffed a heart in dummy, ruffed a third club, ruffed a third heart in dummy, ruffed dummy's last club and ruffed his own last heart with a third trump in dummy; now two rounds of trump were cashed; the S-A conceded and the doubled slam wrapped around E-W's necks... 12 tricks were ice-cold from the start!

It is the bidding which is so interesting; initially, East's 1 H bid is just fine (they were playing a 16-18 point no trump) but please notice South's excellent judgment in not going insane bidding pre-emptively with his fine hand. He simply bid 2 D.

Now it seems to me that West might've done very well at this point to bid nothing but I admit that that's open to question. One really can't fault 2 H too much; North's leap to 4 D was inspired bidding; please notice that he did not cue bid hearts but was content to make the jump raise.

A lot of you may not like East's 4 H bid but I beg you to notice that that contract is on ice (after all, East hadn't

a peek into South's hand as you do!) the inspired logic behind South's leap to 6 D is a delight. He figured that, with both the opponents bidding hearts so strongly, North was probably void; that left only the S-A as an outstanding loser and it was likely outside!

By the way, I refuse to even discuss a 6 H bid by East from you experts with 20/20 hindsight. I'd like to see YOU make that bid AT THE TABLE!!

### Woman's World Art Show Set

## Speech, Hearing Assn. Will Meet In Conference

The American Speech and Hearing Assn. will hold its annual fall conference for the first time in Detroit, in Cobo Hall, Oct. 12-15. The professional organization is made up of more than 15,000 in the fields of speech, language or audiology, who are in private practice or employed by the public schools, universities, hospital-clinics or public health agencies.

A Franklin Village resident, Mary Randolph Sax, will address the assembly on "A Study of Articulatory Maturation Prediction."

The study investigated the process of articulatory maturation in 387 kindergarten children over a four year period. The results will be discussed in terms of clinical implications.

Mrs. Sax is a former supervisor of the speech correction department of Waterford Schools and a former lecturer in speech and language pathology at Marygrove College. She is now affiliated with the Michigan Speech and Hearing Assn., in East Lansing.

The conference will also feature short courses and group discussions concerning the development, disorders, diagnosis, recommendations and treatment of speech, language and hearing impairments.

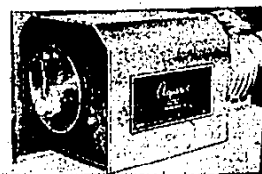
