In past years, awards have been limited to the first three places in each category. However, said White, this time the judges found it so difficult to select only the top three that they went on to honorable mention awards as well.

"As highly flattered as I may feel personally, the real importance of these highly coveted MPA awards lies in the broad scope of recognition accorded overall ONI excellence," said Power.


