anti-abortion amendment to the U.S. Constitution has been introduced by the unlikely twosome of Sen. James Buckley (Con-- N.Y.) and Mark servative O. Hatfield, Oregon's usually - liberal Republican senior

This proposed amendment. co-sponsored by Sens. Hughes of Iowa, Bennett of Utah, Curtis of Nebraska and Bartlett of Oklahoma, was denounced promptly Notre Dame law professor and anti-abortion leader Charles Rice, as being "fatally ambiguous, because it avoids the clear cut term 'moment of conception' ... In-

stead, it opens the door to the morning - after pill ..."

The proposed Buckley -Hatfield Amendment speci-fies that "Unborn offspring nt every stage of their devel-opment" are "human beings"-- as--well-as -"persons," as the term person is mentioned in the lifth and 14th Amendments.

Even more astounding than this proposal to bestow U.S. citizenship upon all American embryos is the amendment's provision whereby this very same citizenship -in - utero may be arbitrarily (and even temporarily) canceled:
"This Article shall not ap-

ply in an emergency (undefined) when a reasonable -medical-certainty-(How-cancertainty be unreasonable?) exists that continuation of the pregnancy will (inthe death cause stantaneous? eventual? probable suicide?) of the moth-

That this proposed amendment is not only ambiguous but a pinnacle of absurdity as well was clearly demonstrated-at-the-Southern Baptist Convention in Portland, by Sen. Hatfield in person.

The attractive and generally intelligent senator was asked during a press confer-ence about the attempt of one young Pennsylvanian to run for the state legislature - by petitioning a court to declare him eligible under the age requirement - on grounds that he had been

conceived in time. (Hatfield: "I never thought about that.")

Would the senator be willing to introduce legislation providing tax exemption for all "unborn children" - and all unborn their mothers to procure extra passports while pregnant and abroad?

(Hatfield: "No.")

Hatfield, a devout Baptist, has become a regular speaker – sometimes preacher – at church conventions, and even at Mayor Richard Daley's prayer breakfast in Chleago.

He was, therefore, asked just how one of these embryonic citizens can be baptized if it is too tiny to determine its sex - or even to be seen with the naked eve?

Hatfield: "I'm from a tra-

dition that doesn't practice infant baptism.

This thigh-slapper - from a senator who presumably expects to be taken seriously on the very serious issue of abortion - got_a lot of :: laughs.)

From a more serious van tage point than Oregon's fun-ny senior senator, the Jesuitmagazine America, as well the Catholic - edited Commonweal. magazine have both taken a very dim view of supporting either this Buckley - Hatfield amendment, or total prohibition amendments offered by Maryland Congressman Lawrence Hogan and North Caro-lina Sen. Jesse Helms.
