**Ordinance.**  
Regulating the maintenance of billiard tables, pool tables, nine or ten-pin alleys and prescribing the licensing thereof, within the Village of Farmington.

The Village of Farmington Ordains:

**SECTION I.** No person shall keep for hire a billiard table, pool table or nine or ten-pin alley within the Village of Farmington without a license from the clerk of the village.

**SECTION II.** A keeper of a billiard table is one who owns, possesses or keeps a billiard table, whereas others are permitted to play, and for which any money or its equivalent, or any check or counter in lieu of money, is paid or received.

**SECTION III.** A keeper of a pool table is one who owns, possesses or keeps a pool table whereon others are permitted to play and for which money or its equivalent, or any check or counter in lieu of money, is paid or received.

**SECTION IV.** A keeper of a nine or ten-pin alley is one who owns, possesses or keeps a full alley on which persons are permitted to play, and for which money or its equivalent, or any check or counter in lieu of money, is paid or received.

**SECTION V.** The clerk of the village is hereby authorized to grant a license to any person to keep a billiard table, pool table or nine or ten-pin alley, on the payment of \$5.00 for each table or for each alley proposed to be kept by such person. Any license so granted under this act shall be for a period of one year.

**SECTION VI.** No person receiving a license under this ordinance shall permit in or about his or her place, any minor child under seventeen years of age, unless accompanied by his parent or legal guardian.

**SECTION VII.** Every person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars or by imprisonment in the county jail of Oakland county for a period not exceeding ninety days or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

**SECTION VIII.** That all ordinances, or parts of ordinances, inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

**SECTION IX.** This ordinance shall be in effect on and after the 24th day of May, A. D. 1909.


