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

Michigan's newest darling of harness racing fans, especially those at Hazel Park, receives its stiffest assignment of the year tonight at the east side track in the preferred trot.

We are referring to Cool King, a red hot three year old sired by B.F. Coaltown who will be bidding for a seventh straight victory.

Cool King, owned by Stewart Oldford of Plymouth and
N. Lebendom of Detroit, has
suddenly developed into one
of the best trotters at Hazel
Park.

In fact it came up so fast Racing Secretary Bill Connors found it necessary to advance it to the preferred class after recording six in a row, the last in a quick 2:04.3.

The colt has won nine of 11 starts during 1973, the last six consecutively and hasn't been out of the money all year, showing a second and a third.

The competition is a bit rough tonight since Cool King will be facing such speedsters as Sirloin, generally considered the No. 1 trotter at the track despite a bad break a week ago which resulted in an eighth place finish; Noblette, winner of the Coon Memorial earlier in the year and now returning to the races after a rest; and Mystic Boy, winner of the featured trotting event a week

It may be that Cool King will be exactly that, a cool king, but then it may be that he'll find the top ones a bit too much.

The colt won in 2:04.3 a week ago and appeared capable of even more speed if pressed. But this time it goes against Sirloin with a mark of 2:03, Noblette with 2:03 and Mystic Boy, who has defeated both.

However, it is nice to see a Michigan owner come up with a trotter making so much progress in a single

The Oldfords, senior and junior, have been gradually building a powerful stable and it appears they have successfully hurdled a major obstacle with the development of Cool King.
