Usually, the public needs no help in cheating itself, culturally. But in this case, a few more performances might have brought them out

of their dungeons and into the theater in Plymouth Central School auditorium, Church at Main Street.

The cabaret-style presentation of the first production was a charming idea. For some it may be nice to be wined, dined and entertained from the same table, in the same room, the same evening.

But assuming the whole community got ambitious and came to the theater, where would they be seated with a dozen or so tables, capable of seating approximately 50, taking up the entire auditorium?

It reminded me of school lunches in that same auditorium a few years ago when it was a high school cafeteria — no place to sit and plenty of other places I would rather be eating.

I say forget the food, increase the seating capacity and extend the performance dates for a sometimes slow-witted public.

The PTG certainly has the talent to warrant those moves.
