ich. "We will be changing our pass coverage and mixing from a zone to man-to-man.

The final program will be an average one as far as races are concerned but it will be a big one for those patrons who appreciate giveaways and always hope they'll win the big prize.

Perhaps the one prize that stands out over the others is a 100-pound steer that will go to some lucky winner of a contest. With prices of beef where they are these days, winning the steer would be just like having the only ticket in a perfecta...the money value would be about the same.

There will be turkeys for those winning some of the contests as well as numerous other awards.

It may not be the greatest day at the races but at least it will be a different ending.

Post time for the first race will be 1:30 p.m. and Vice President and General Manager Dick Wilson hopes to have fans streaming out of

the plant after the finale before 6 p.m.

"The lessons we learned this year should prove invaluable in making out plans for 1974 when we expect to have the honor of opening thoroughbred racing in Michigan," said Wilson.

"The racing commissioner probably won't announce next year's dates until the end of the month but we do have an arrangement with Hazel Park to alternate and it's our turn to have the early days."

Meanwhile, Hazel Park is busy converting the racing strip from the hard clay surface for the trotters and pacers to the soft track for the runners.
