

Bank Chain Appoints New Policy Committee

Five regional Michigan National Corp. banks have established a southeastern Michigan executive council, according to Stanford C. Stoddard, president of the \$2.9 billion holding company.

George A. Pierson was named chairman of the council. William E. Dove was named vice chairman, and Gerald J. DeVore was made controller.

The membership will be

made up of the chief executive officers of the five affiliated banks operating in southeastern Michigan and certain officers of these banks. They are Michigan National Bank of Detroit; MNB - North Metro; MNB - West Metro; MNB - Oakland; and the newly opened Greenfield National Bank (Dearborn).

"The executive council was needed to provide an effective vehicle for the coordination of policy by the area club holdings where members and guests on these tracts are concerned."

The quiet periods on snowmobiling do cover state and federal lands plus acreages of private firms which, as a matter of company policy, have made their holdings open to public hunting. The law attempts to control indiscriminate use of snowmobiles during the state's firearm deer season.

Snowmobiles To Be Hushed

SNOWMOBILES are reminded to observe morning and afternoon quiet periods on public hunting lands during Michigan's Nov. 15-30 firearm deer season. It is illegal to operate snowmobiles "in an area on which public hunting is permitted during the season open to the taking of deer with firearms from 7 to 11 a.m. and from 2 to 5 p.m."

As exceptions to this rule, snowmobiles may be used during these quiet hours:

(1) In the case of an emergency;

(2) For law enforcement purposes;

(3) To go to and from a permanent residence or a hunting camp otherwise inaccessible by a conventional wheeled vehicle;

(4) For the conduct of necessary work functions involving land and timber survey, communication and transmission line patrol and timber harvest operations.

The restriction does not cover the operation of snowmobiles on private lands by persons who own or control these lands, or are using them as invited guests. As

State Colleges Show Increase In '73 Students



ANN ARBOR A total of 403,253 students have enrolled in Michigan colleges and universities this fall, an increase of 3.5 percent over the previous year, according to the Michigan Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers.

The total on-campus enrollment in 1972 showed no significant changes from 1971.

Ben F. Munn, University of Michigan assistant registrar and a member of the association's committee on statistical information and research, reported that the total enrollment represents 90 institutions in the state.

Of the total, said Munn, 245,391 are undergraduates, an increase of 2.7 percent over last year; 43,097 graduate students, an increase of 10 percent; and 10,765 grad-

uate professionals (those in such fields as medicine and law), an increase of 10.1 percent.

However, Munn noted, the number of new freshmen, or those attending college for the first time, dropped from 94,266 last fall to 87,572 this fall, or a decrease of 7.2 percent.

The increase in the total on-campus enrollment is greater among women students than men, Munn reported. The number of women students increased from 164,984 to 174,437, or 9.43 percent this year, compared with an increase of 4.51 percent for men, from 224,301 last year to 228,816 this year.

These enrollment figures are based on reports from all types of public and private institutions of higher education.
