Skating Offers Hope *You Must Have Goggles*

There's hope for those who stay away from sports because they're too expensive, too complicated, too rough, or too exerting.

This "ideal" sport, according to Betsy McCarthy, is roller skating. Mrs. McCarthy of Detroit, is secretary of the Michigan Skating Union.

Although she doesn't skate, she's actively involved in the skating club and would like to see the sport ranked with ice skating, tennis and skiing.

"I believe roller skating, more than any other sport, teaches good sportsmanship."

She explained that roller skating is very similar to ice skating, both stylistically and competitively. She emphatically states they are not "roller derby people."

"In a competitive meet they're out there to win, but there are no bad feelings if they don't. They're like a family and they respect one another."

Most competitive skaters



range in age from five years to 67 years. But it's not unusual, Mrs. McCarthy says, to see some younger than five and older than 67.

Mrs. McCarthy has a seven-year-old son, Patrick, now entering his first year of competitive skating. This year he won the national championship in freestyle skating.

Mrs. McCarthy says skaters have to be dedicated to be really good.

"A good skater will practice at least four hours a day, four days a week. Its like any other sport—the more you practice, the better you are."

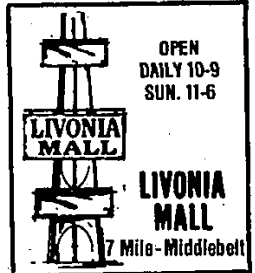
Mrs. McCarthy says roller skating is also a sport which can be easily adapted to any budget.

"You can become really adept without making a large investment. Actually, it's cheaper than on ice."

Clubs within the Michigan Skating Union are open to any amateur skater. Mrs. McCarthy says you don't have to be a competitive skater to join, although most of their members are.

"It's the kind of sport you can spend as much time or money on as you can afford and still enjoy it."

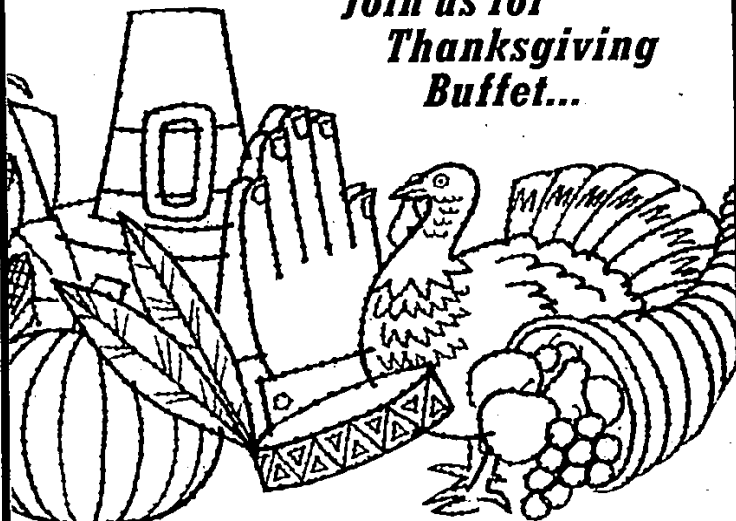

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN ZONING AMENDATORY ORDINANCE ORDINANCE NO. 29-C-3

An Ordinance to amend the Zoning Ordinance No. 29 of the City of Farmington Hills, as amended:

The City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, hereby ordains:

Section 1. That the zoning map of said Ordinance No. 29 of the City of Farmington Hills, as amended, be amended by Ordinance No. 29-C-3 and the same is hereby amended to show RUC-2 (multiple) where RA-2 is now shown in the area described in Rezoning Request 5-2-73:

Part of the E. 1/4 of the NW. 1/4, Section 14, Town 1 North, Range 9 East, Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, beginning at the north 1/4 corner of said section 14, Town 1 North, Range 9 East, thence along the north and south 1/4 line of Section 14 S. 7° 15' 30" W. 114.97 feet, thence along the northerly line of Interstate Highway I-696, 514.37 feet along the arc of a curve to the left, said curve having a radius of 3061.79 feet, a central angle of 9° 37' 32" and whose chord bears N. 77° 43' 35" W. 513.78 feet; thence along the east line of Supervisor's Plat of Forest Hills Subdivision (Liber 12, Page 54 of Plats, Oakland County Records) N. 0° 01' 40" W. 946.15 feet; thence along the north line of Section 14 S. 89° 23' 00" E. 495.24 feet to the point of beginning, subject to rights of the public in Twelve Mile Road and subject to easement and/or rights of way of record, containing 11.69 acres more or less.

Section 2. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

Section 3. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect Twenty-One (21) days after their enactment.

Section 4. This Ordinance is hereby declared to have been adopted by the Council Members of the City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, at a regular meeting thereof duly called and held on the 15th day of November, 1973, and ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.
