## Tree Sale Will Benefit Jaeger Fund

FARMINGTON Funds raised by the annual Farmington Jaycee Christmas Tree Sale will be donated to the Susan Jaeger reward fund, according to sale chairman Nick Pollard.

The Jaycees will be selling trees at their lot at Farmington Rd. and Nine Mile. The sale will be held Dec. 14-16. Hours are 3-9 p.m. Dec. 13; 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Dec. 14; and noon to 9 p.m. Dec. 15.

The local fund for the missing seven-year-old is now up to \$10,000 according to representatives of the non-profit corporation organized to raise the money.

The fund was started by several neighbors of the William Jaegers, parents of the girl.

The Jaegers announced the formation of the fund in October to encourage a tipster who might have more infor-

mation concerning her disappearance.

The Jaegers said they believe their daughter is still alive.

She was kidnapped from their tent while they were in Montana camping last summer. A massive search following the abduction was unfruitful.

The reward fund is hoped to be an incentive for more information concerning the missing girl.

A ransom call a week after the kidnapping was the strongest evidence their daughter is still alive, according to the Jaegers.

The Jaegers said they would either return the money or donate it to charity if it couldn't be given out in a reasonable period of time.
