Police Describe Murder Suspect

The finding of a driver's license in the victim's shoe led this week to positive identification of a murdered woman in Farmington Township as police spread their quest for a prime suspect throughout the midwest.

Township Chief Irving Yakes identified a badly decomposed body discovered Monday in the underbrush north of 13 Mile Rd. and east of Haggerty Rd., as that of 43-year-old Mrs. Olivia Allen, of 9320 Quincey, Detroit.

An autopsy performed by Dr. Richard Olson of St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Pontiac, showed a fractured skull, indicating Mrs. Allen had died as the result of a blow on the head by a blunt instrument.

WHETHER Mrs. Allen, the mother of six, was killed elsewhere and the body then driven to the Farmington area for hiding, or whether she was slain here and the body then immediately discarded, still is a matter of police conjecture. Temporarily, at least, Farmington Township police have exercised jurisdiction in the

case.

Officers learned of the body late Monday morning shortly after it had been discovered by Joseph Bush, a neighboring resident. After finding the driver's license, they brought the victim's husband and a son to the area to make positive identification.

Mrs. Allen had been reported missing to the Detroit Police Department July 10 after she had failed to show up on schedule at her job as a waitress in Detroit's Greyhound bus terminal. It was 12 days later when her body was discovered.

Swift action by township police has culled the possible suspects to one individual, for whom a murder warrant has been issued by the office of the Oakland County prosecutor.

A search of the suspect's alleged Detroit haunts has failed to provide a lead on his whereabouts, according to officers, although from another source it has been indicated he has fled from the state.

TOWNSHIP officers said that

articles found at the scene where the body was located have been sent to the Michigan State Police crime laboratory, but a report of their analysis still is being awaited.

It was revealed by police that the man being sought is a male Negro, age estimated at from 50 to 52, of muscular build, having black hair and brown eyes, standing five-feet-six and weighing approximately 165 pounds.

He is said to have a wart or mole on the bridge of his nose, and has possession of a black 1961 or 1962 Ford carrying the Missouri license plate GH 7317. Any person with information of his whereabouts is asked to contact the Farmington Township Police immediately.
