

New Horizons open to handicapped

FARMINGTON
New Horizons, a vocational rehabilitation organization, has 70 immediate openings for handicapped persons between the ages of 16 and 25 in its job training programs.

The private, non-profit organization has been designated by the Oakland County

Intermediate School district as the rehabilitation center for all handicapped of Oakland County between the ages of 16 and 25.

The students will receive job training at state expense through the Mandatory Education Act which requires that the state public school systems provide special edu-

cation for the handicapped through the ages of 25.

New Horizons can accommodate up to 250 students at its three centers in Pontiac, Madison Heights and Farmington Hills. The Farmington center is located in Westbrook, Elementary School, 2120 Osmus, Farmington Hills.

Persons interested in joining the training programs can contact the Pontiac center, 117 Turk. Students will be evaluated and assigned to one of the programs. The students are paid weekly wages of from \$2 to \$70 depending on work productivity to increase their incentive.

The end objective of our

rehabilitation program is placement of clients in competitive employment," said Glen D. Smith, executive director. "Statistically, some of our most severely handicapped clients can be expected to work within our sheltered environment in the future."

"But an encouraging per-

centage do succeed in qualifying for and holding down jobs in industry and commerce that permit them to be self-supporting instead of living life of dependency on others."

Fifty clients placed in competitive employment during the first 10 months of 1973, he said.

beginning Jan. 14, feature a variety of courses in business, crafts, recreation, language and avocations.

One new offering is a metrics class to familiarize residents with that system of measurements.

The Farmington public library staff will give information for parents on how to help their children learn in a

course called "Parents Guide for Children."

Detailed information on all courses is available from the school Office of Extended Services.

Among avocation courses offered are ground school for private pilot rating, an instrument ground school, powder puff mechanics, auto tuneup and repair, welding,

basic electronics, community band and orchestra, photography and beginning guitar.

Business courses include typing, both beginner and refresher shorthand, stenography, accounting and bookkeeping, business machines, business English and a course in "money mystique," which includes investments and estate planning.

Arts and crafts classes include drawing and painting, ceramics, weaving, macrame and jewelry design and construction.

Homemaking classes offer sewing from beginners to tailoring, knitting, crocheting, cake decorating, home entertainment, upholstery and furniture refinishing.

German, Spanish and French are available for those interested in languages.

Recreational topics include bridge, square dancing, volleyball, karate, judo, gymnastics and Hatha Yoga.

Also scheduled are special classes in speed reading and recreational swimming.
