## School tax vote date is debated

An election on renewing was unable to agree millage affecting about \$1.9 date for the election. million of the Farmington Suggestions include School District's revenue is coming up this spring, but the board was unable Tuesday to decide on exactly

After about an hour's debate, the board voted to direct the administration to reserve a date "sometime in April."

Two issues, totaling five mills and representing about \$1.9 million in revenue, about 10 per cent of the budget, are expiring this year, according to Business Manager William Prisk.

"There is no question we will need the money from the renewal," Prisk said. He cited contracted increases for teachers and other staff, increases in costs of fuel, and a general increase in the cost of living.

An anticipated increase in assessments for both the cities of Farmington and Farmington Hills could add about 10 per cent to tax bills. Prisk explained this would not be reflected directly as increased revenue for the district.

"The state aid formula reduces state aid as local reve-nue increases," he said. "If local revenue goes up \$1 mil-lion, it means the district gets between \$300,000 and \$400,000 after the loss of aid is accounted for."

Prisk made the statement in response to questions from the audience regarding the increased assessment.

Suggestions included voting on the renewal in April, vot ing during the regular board election in June, or possibly holding a special election in August.

Trustee Gary Lichtman supported the April date, saying "millages make great political platforms. We should separate this form politics in June."
