Oster to stand trial on murder charge

SOUTHFIELD Ronald Oster, charged with the New Year's Eve stabbing death of a Farmington youth, has been bound over to Oak-land Cqunty Circuit Court for trial. He is being held with-out bond on an open charge of murder. STORY, HOUR

Oster, 26 of Livonia was re-manded to Oakland County Jail by Southfield 46th Dis-trict Judge Clarence Reid af-ter three days of preliminary examination.

Oster is charged with the slaving of Alan Goodman, 16, of Farmington, after a flight at a New Year's party in the Southfield home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Kohn. The Kohns; of Jeanette St. were out of town when the party was held by the couple's three daughters. SKI BUS.

Diane Kohn, 22, Oster's girlfriend, testified Goodman and Oster fought over her at the party. She said after the tussle that she saw Oster wipe blood off a knife and telephone police.

"Half of the guests at the party didn't realize Goodman had been stabbed. Ron didn't un or throw the knife away, and he called the police. Is that premeditated murder? Ron never met Goodman before. There was no malice aforethought."

Plunkett maintained none Plunkett maintained none of the witnesses saw Oster throw a punch, but several saw Goodman "land some good ones." He said Goodman threw Oster against the wall and that Oster's eye was cut in the fracas.

Plunkett said Oster always carried a camping knife which he used to make leath-er goods in his work. "He didn't carry the knife to stab someone. There have been someone. There have been many versions of the incident by witnesses. I challenge anyone to put the testimonies together and tell the sequence of events.

"The witnesses were good friends of Goodman. They were all trying to be truth-ful."

"Does this sound like a man who committed passionate manslaughter?" Oster called police, said 'murder', wiped off his krife and washed his shirt. He lied about his involvement in the fight. >

It is up to a jury-to decide if Oster is guilty of murder in the first or second degree, Reid said. Oster will be arraigned on the information Jan. 24 before Oakland County. Circuit Judge John O'Brien.


