

IN THE POCKET

Competition along the metropolitan bowling front was filled with surprises during the past week.

For instance, little Lynn Irons, a nine-year-old, topped the big four — the 4-6-7-10 — at Merri-Bowl Saturday and Kenny Kozma, who is only 11 years old, came through with a 103 triplicate at Woodward Lanes.

Meanwhile, Eddie Lubanski, one-time holder of the world invitational title and a headliner for years, failed to qualify for the finals this coming weekend in the Masters Tournament conducted by the Greater Detroit Bowling Association.

The showing of the two young bowlers was the best of the season in the youth leagues and added another rich chapter to the work being done by the youth instructors.

Lubanski's downfall came as a shock to those who have been accustomed to seeing him battle with the leaders. But the figures tell the story and he will be among the spectators at Orchard Lanes when Roger Thorpe defends the match game title on Saturday.

Heading the challengers will be Mike Totsky, who paced the eight game qualifying round with an 1817. This gave him a seven pin edge over Fred Vitak while Chuck Sunseri was third with 1799.

Lubanski was able to score a mere 1636, and missed qualifying by 15 pins. He had company, though, when Don Wray, another all-star turned in a 1624.

Four more bowlers will be enshrined in the Detroit Bowling Hall of Fame when the 1973 class is admitted on March 23 in the Detroit Historical Museum.

Heading the list is Mary Beck, one-time Detroit councilwoman who has been one of the game's best boosters over the years.

She will be joined by Charles A. (Buck) Walby, one of the more aggressive proprietors, and Bill Bunetta, member of the famed E&B and Pfeiffer teams when they won the ABC titles.

The posthumous selection was Fred Bujack, also a member of the Pfeiffer team when it was at the peak of the nation's teams.
