## Yes, you do need to think about rape

If they can face squarely one of the most unpleasant subjects you could name, women in Observerland have

an opportunity to gain invaluable knowledge.

It's being offered in a Schoolcraft-College-community. nity services course titled Protection Against Rape, and the knowledgeable instructor will be a retired Detroit po-

licewoman. She is Mrs. Dorothy Gay, who retired last January after more than 25 years on the Detroit force. She and her husband, Alva, a Wayne

her husband, Alva, a Wayne State University faculty member, now make their home in Northville.

"Rape is something women who live in the suburbs don't like to think about," Mrs. Gay said. "But statistics show that rape in Michigan has increased by 70 per cent has increased by 70 per cent in the last five years.

"And there's still the probability that three to 10 times as many rapes are committed as are reported." That, she added, is because

women do not understand their rights when they have been victimized by a rapist, as well as the shame that keeps them from going to the

"What I want to do is have the class discuss the possi-bility of rape so that its members can prepare their thoughts and feelings a bit. Unless you think about what might happen and what ac-tion could be taken, you can-

not be prepared.
Mrs. Gay said the Mrs. Gay said the three-week course, to be offered Thursday evenings be-ginning Feb. 21, will not lay much stress on physical self-defense.

"I do want to stress an awareness of various facets of the matter and the legal rights of rape victims. As a retired police officer, I de-finitely think all rapes should be reported, and I'll try to explain why."

She said she also would recommend the use of the voice, the fingernails, the and anything to be found in a purse like a pen or key as defense against attack.

"But I firmly believe that unless a woman has taken specific training, any other weapon can be dangerous,"

she added. "It can be taken away and used against her.'

Mrs. Gay said she thinks today's environment is a main reason for the increase

"There is so much sex and violence in movies, television, reading, current songs," she said. "It encour-ages any deviations that might be there."

Before retiring, Dorothy Gay ran into the residence problem that has made headlines in recent weeks.

She said she and her husband purchased their North-ville property during the pe-riod when it seemed that police officers were going to be permitted to live in suburban

"Then we came home from a vacation and found that the ruling had gone in favor of the city of Detroit," she said.

'So, since I was planning to retire soon, we went ahead with the house and my husband moved in, in February, 1972. I lived with my mother in Detroit and came out weekends.

"I was an inspector by that time and felt it important for me to live by the ruling -- I had no quarrel with it. But it was hard to convince people I was living in Detroit."
