

Ocelot matmen win invitational

Already rated No. 7 among junior colleges in the nation, Schoolcraft College wrestlers enhanced their reputation with top honors in the Grand Rapids Invitational.

Teams from New York, Illinois, and Ohio, as well as Michigan participated in the 12-team tourney.

The Ocelots captured two firsts, a second, and four fourth place finishes in besting New York's Farmingdale Community College for the team title.

Johnnie Jones at 118 pounds and Howard Strick at 126 pounds were Schoolcraft's individual champions. Maurice Stewart placed second for Schoolcraft at 190 pounds.

Fourth place finishes were registered by Mike Mirick at 158, Mark Kast at 167, Ray Givens at 177 and Fred Staton, heavyweight.

The Ocelots piled up 104½ points in winning the team title with Farmingdale second at 97.

Following Schoolcraft and Farmingdale were Grand Valley State, Grand Rapids, Cuyahoga West (Ohio), Blackhawk College (Illinois), Triton (Illinois), Muskegon College, Lorain County College (Ohio), Harper Junior College (Illinois), Cuyahoga Metro (Ohio) and Delta Community College.

The Ocelots also upped their dual meet record to 12-2 by downing Kellogg and Jackson Community Colleges last week.

Schoolcraft dumped Kellogg, 44-2 and topped Jackson, 42-9.

John Osentoski (118), Dan Longline (126), Howard Strick (134), Gary Banks (150) and Mark Kast (167) registered pins in the victory over Kellogg while Bernard Wells (142), Ray Givens (177), Maurice Stewart (190) and Fred Staton (heavyweight) gained decisions.

Strick, Wells, and Givens had pins in the victory over Jackson with Osentoski and Stewart gaining decisions.

Dick Beattie, the well-known Observerland pin speller, struck another telling blow for the southpaws in their bid to take over domination of the bowling game, when he paced the field to win the Masters title last weekend.

Bill Spargo, Observerland's top average bowler landed third. Mike Samardja, the former Stroth star, placed fourth with a 222 average for the entire tournament at North Hills.
