It was defeated by the Senate last time out but this is a differ-ent year, a slightly-different bill and no heat on legislators from the metropolitan press. Don't be surprised if dog racing is approved.

A Legislature which has approved a state lottery, the return of bingo and is still looking for other painless ways of bolstering the state treasury, probably wouldn't have any compunctions about passing another type of gam-

The dog racing lobby has become stronger and stronger through the years and this could well be the year in which all of the work in the shirt night past finally pays off.
