

## Teen Center calls for volunteers

The summer teen center, sponsored by the Farmington Youth Assistance is already looking ahead to next July.

It is during the months of July and August that the teen center operates and next summer will be its fourth year. That is if enough volunteers come through to help with the program.

The center started in 1971. Last summer it was held at William Grace school and open from 3 p.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Friday. Field trips were frequently scheduled on Saturdays.

Mrs. Pat Erger who headed the volunteer staff last year says that more than 200 young people, 12 through 20 signed up for the programs and of this an average of 100 were there each day.

IN ADDITION to field trips, activities centered around arts and crafts, sports, dances, rap groups and providing as Mrs. Erger puts it, "a place to go."

She is hoping that willing volunteers will come forth now so that programs can be planned and the facility organized.

"I'd like to get people right now," she says, "and they've got to be people who like this kind of a program and can work with young people."
