THE VICARIATE is hoping to defray costs of the radio time as well as give money to assist both Birthright and Right to be Born.

by volunteers and both are completely supported by private gifts.

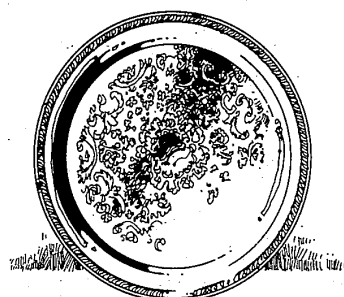
This will replace the annual card party and program planners Ann Oppertbauer and Pat Muzzarelli have planned an evening of Las Vegas fun.
